

Hugo Boss has made no commitment that we can find to ensure a living wage is paid across its supplier network.



Hugo Boss should commit publicly to ensuring a living wage is paid across its supply chain.





Hugo Boss should commit to a published plan describing how a living wage will be achieved in a reasonable time-frame.

No evidence was found that Hugo Boss takes steps to safeguard wages when they are in price negotiations with suppliers. This allows suppliers to put profit margins ahead of wage security for workers.



Hugo Boss should isolate labour from other production costs, so its suppliers do not cut wages in order to negotiate lower prices.

Several benchmarks are available for companies to measure whether wages are sufficient to meet the basic needs of workers and their families.

No evidence was found of public information on gender pay gaps in its supply chain.

No data about wages currently paid to workers at its suppliers is disclosed.



Hugo Boss does not publicly report on unionization of workers nor on existing collective bargaining agreements in its supplier factories.
